Ten Home Rules For Children

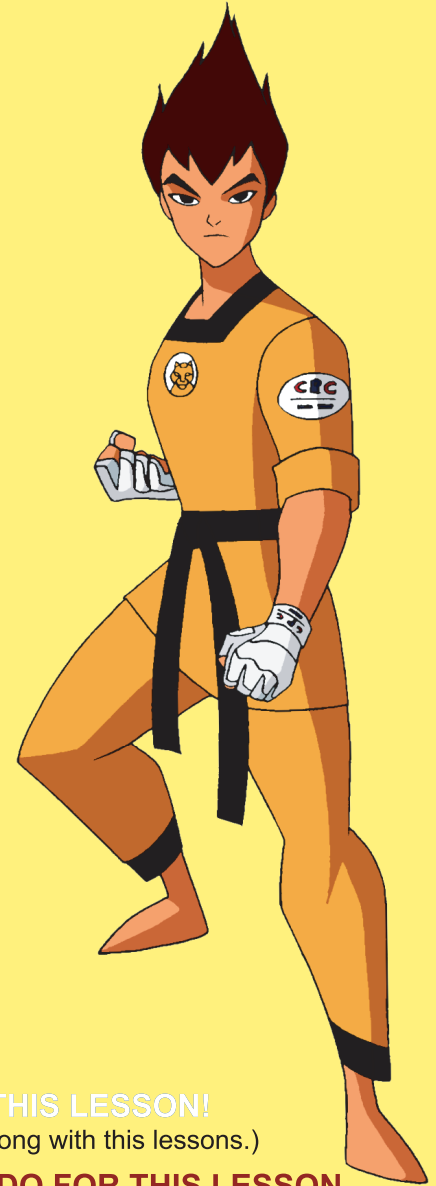
- 1) Be polite and thoughtful when speaking to others

Appropriate Behavior : One handles school property carefully.

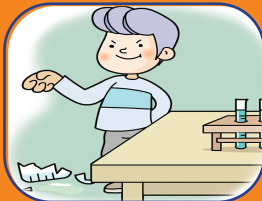
Trevor knocks his chair around roughly, and scratches the wood.
